Introduction:

Recap the previous lesson, highlighting the key aspects for the pupils. Remind pupils that in the last lesson you discussed what you might like to change or do more of in school.

As a class, discuss our favourite activities and things we feel we are good at and why.

Provide opportunities for pupil voice and work together to determine a special activity/ lesson through voting – this could be anything from free choice to messy art to a game of football. The important thing is that the pupils have the opportunity to make choices and vote on it. You may wish to pre-select pictures of activities pupils like to support low-level learners.

This is an idea you can introduce into class life and offer on a weekly basis. You may wish to turn the vote into a list explaining that you will do one activity a week until all of the choices are done.

Main Activity:

Some examples of activities pupils may choose:

Drama/Dance

P.E. / Sports

Sensory Room

Painting

Reading

Outdoor play

Sensory session

Ongoing: Complete page 11 of the My Rights Booklet

Plenary:

As a class re-cap the lesson:

- What have we learned today?

Ask the class what they enjoyed about the activity and what they would change about it.

Ask the pupils to self-assess how they think they performed during the activity and celebrate an aspect of each pupil's involvement.

The more able learners may be able to celebrate the success and achievements of others.

As a teacher it is important to offer praise to the pupils for their participation and willingness to try new things. You may wish to choose a celebratory song or activity (like an applause circle) to recognise pupils participation.

AFL:

Understanding can be assessed through questioning and verbal feedback. Self-assessment will further AFL with the learners providing appropriate reasons and understanding for what participation means. Refer back to the lesson objectives have they been achieved?

Differentiation:

- Support hearing impaired learners with appropriate sign language
- Support ASD / low-level learners with PECS / Pictures of reference
- Vary the activities so that all learners are able to choose and participate at a level suitable to their needs
