Rights Challenge Badge – Welcome Information

This badge has been developed to inform children and young people about the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child (sometimes called the UNCRC), and the role of the Children's Commissioner for Wales.

The badge has been designed so that the children can lead their own learning, with support from you. This guide provides you with the extra information you need to support children and young people during the challenge.

Hopefully, this badge will help children and young people to have fun, to be challenged and, more importantly, to learn something about children's rights and the Children's Commissioner's work.

The badge requirements are accompanied by activities that Brownies/ Cubs can tale part in to achieve the Challenge Bagde.

The activities provide children and young people with an instant progamme, a list of equipment required and a step-by-step guide on how to carry out the activity. The activities can be completed independently; however, your group may wish to take on the Rights Challenge Badge together.

Leaders can choose the best resources to support the individual children in their group. Some children will prefer to use our children's rights symbols resource and some will prefer to use the children's rights poster.

We have tried to make the Challenge Badge as user friendly as possible. We would be glad to have your views on the badge and any variations or suggestions on activities.

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Badge Requirements

At the end of the Rights Challenge badge children and young people will:

Know and be able to name at least 3 children's rights and will have told someone outside of Brownies/ Cubs about these rights

Know the name of the Children's Commissioner for Wales

Know what the Children's Commissioner for Wales does

Know where to get information on children's rights

Activity 5 in their work pack will help children to double check they have completed all requirements.

Children's Commissioner for Wales and the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child

Sally Holland is the current Children's Commissioner for Wales, a post she has held since April 2015. You can find more out about Sally Holland and her role on our website <u>www.childrenscommissioner.wales</u>

Sally has five powers as Commissioner. They are:

- To Listen to children and young people to find out what's important to them
- **To Support** children and young people to find out about children's rights
- **To Advise** and support children and young people or those who care for them if they feel that a child has been treated unfairly
- **To Influence** government and other organisations to make sure children get their rights
- **To Speak up** for children and young people nationally on important issues being the children's champion in Wales.

UNCRC stands for United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child.

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It's a list of children's rights that all children and young people have, everywhere in the world, no matter who they are, where they live or what they believe in.

The UNCRC has 54 articles in it, 42 rights are for children and young people up to 18 years of age. The rest are all about how governments and adults should work together to make sure children and young people can access their rights.

Children's rights are all the things that children and young people need to make sure that they are safe, have the things they need to survive and develop, and have a say in decisions that affect their lives.

Activities

During the Rights Challenge Badge, children will complete four different activities and an evaluation form.

It is possible that your group will already have an understanding of rights form school; many schools are supporting children to learn about rights so some young people may be aware of the UNCRC.

Activity 1: Rights Body

This activity will ask children to think about the things they need to grow up happy, healthy and safe. They will then use a rights poster or symbols pack to link their answers to children's rights.

If children need support with this activity, you could show them the rights poster and symbols pack.

Activity 2: Children's Rights

In this activity, children will complete an activity sheet, noting down three rights they have.

They will then have to choose one person in their family or a friend outside of Brownies/ Cubs to tell them about what they have learnt.

Activity 3: Sally and her Super Powers

This is an art activity; children will learn about Sally's Super Powers and will create a Superhero showing how the Commissioner can use her powers.

If children need support with this activity, you may want to show them the introduction video one more time.

Activity 4: Rights Kite

This activity is a fun group activity, if your whole pack has been working towards the Rights Challenge Badge they may wish to do this together as a celebration. Children may need some support from an adult to make their kite.

Activity 5: My Rights Badge

This is an evaluation form for children to write or draw down how much they have learnt.

Once they have handed in their completed form they can get their Rights Challenge Badge.
